

## **Essential Questions and Suggested Sessions for the 2020 OPPI Conference**

Essential questions exist to provoke further questioning by the learner and promote the concept of individuals becoming **lifelong learners**. A question may be essential if it:

- Causes genuine and relevant inquiry into big ideas and core content;
- Provokes deep thought, lively discussion, sustained inquiry and new understanding
- requires learners to consider alternatives, weigh evidence, support their ideas, and justify their answers;
- stimulates vital, on-going rethinking of big ideas, assumptions, and prior lessons;
- sparks meaningful connections with prior learning and personal experiences; or
- Naturally recurs, creating opportunities for transfer to other situations and subjects.

During this moment in history, large portions of the world are experiencing a Civil Rights uprising. While protests against the realities of systemic discrimination and institutionalized racism continue, it is important for professional planners to examine the following essential questions with a contemporary lens and realize that racism, sexism, homophobia, transphobia and ableism have long existed, and have often times served as barriers to public participation and representation in planning processes. As professional planners, we have a duty to listen to diverse voices, learn more about how the systems we work under have negatively impacted marginalized people, and to better understand how we can change the conversations, and the work we do, to create more inclusive and equitable communities in Ontario.
